The Witness of Presence

1. Definition

A Christian's public testimony passively demonstrated through the Christian's values expressed in word and deed.

Notice it is not the same as friendship evangelism, nor is it the same as holiness

The Witness of Presence

This is not the same as friendship evangelism.

Friendship evangelism is commonly understood as:

It is the intentional effort of believers to internalize the gospel, experience personal transformation and through the empowerment of the Holy Spirit, exemplify Christ likeness as a way of life. The Apostle Paul describes the process of this transformed lifestyle accordingly; "Be not conformed to this world; but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind, that ye may prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect will of God" Romans 12:2. The renewal of the mind produces reformation in the way people live, interact and serve.

The Witness of Presence

This is not the same as contextual evangelism.

Contextual evangelism is commonly understood as:

Adopting the lifestyle of the people in the community in order to be viewed as approachable. The assumption is that if people see us as approachable, they will talk about faith with us.

What is wrong with the definition of contextual evangelism?

The Witness of Presence

1. Definition

A Christian's public testimony passively demonstrated through the Christian's <u>values</u> expressed in word and deed.

In Christ we are able to experience:

Identity- Romans 6:1-4; Galatians 2:20 Renewal- Romans 12:2; 2 Corinthians 5:16-17 Certainty- Romans 8:37-39; Philippians 1:6 Sufficiency- Matthew 6:26-33; 2 Peter 1:3-8

The Witness of Presence

2. It's importance

- It is the testimony that most experience from us.
- It was a critical "marker" in the early growth of Christianity.
- It has the power to validate or invalidate all other forms of witness.

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The Witness of Presence

- 3. Is formed by an internal transformation.
 - Embraces the priesthood.
 - · Confidence in the work of the Holy Spirit.
 - Other focused
 - Authentic
 - · Anticipates God moments in everyday life.

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The Witness of Presence

- 4. How we are assessed by others-
 - · Sunday morning
 - · Our treatment of others
 - Our response to crises
 - · Our outlook on life
 - · Our response to guilt and shame

They are not looking for perfection. Perfect people are fake, it just means they are better than most at hiding their faults. The are looking for a consistent reliance and value of faith.

The Witness of Presence


- 5. How we assess ourselves-
 - · Our bank statements.
 - Our calendar.

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Look at your bank statement- Where is faith expressed in your distribution of funds? How was generosity practiced this past month? Look at your calendar- How was your value of Christ demonstrated in your use of time? Where did you build margins to allow for unexpected interruptions for the care of others? (God, others, and yourself)

Witness of opportunity almost always occur in the context of a relationship.

3. Why it is important?


The witness of presence tells the observer that you value your faith. Through the witness of opportunity we are able to speak of the opportunity of faith for the seeker.

The Witness of Opportunity


- 4. Why doesn't it happen?
 - 1. The person isn't ready for the conversation.

 - 3. We have not established and/or developed a relational connection with those who need to hear.

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

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Transactional relationships will most regularly product witness of opportunity sharing. People are most open to simple explanations or personal opinions rather than long or deep discussions.

At this level of sharing, the listener is trying to assess consistency between what you do and what you say you value.



The Witness of Opportunity

- 5. Why is it important?
 - 1. We are called to be a ready witness.
 - 2. Faith comes from hearing. Romans 10:17
 - 3. A question is often the first step to a living relationship with Jesus.

The Witness of Opportunity

- 5. How do we prepare?
 - Develop ready responses to potential questions by considering God's presence in the challenges you face.
 - 2. Focus on basic touch points, rather than memorizing a speech.
 - 3. Create an environment that invites conversation.

Conversational Evangelism

- 1. Strike up a simple conversation with people you meet.
- 2. Start quick, lite conversations as often as you can.
- 3. Adjust your schedule.



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Good questions are:

- Born out a desire to better understand someone.
- Flow naturally out of your context and conversations.
- Demonstrate that you have listened thoughtfully.
- Are open-ended and promote more dialogue and reflection.
- Probe sensitively and reflectively into someone's belief systems.
- Compel others to investigate the Christian life.

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Doug Pollock in his book, "God Space" warns that questions should not be used to gain control of the conversation. They should not be used as a springboard to launch a monologue.

Good questions are not:

- Used to get control of a conversation so you can get your point across.
- A set of memorized questions to herd people toward a decision you think they should make.
- A springboard from which to launch into a monologue.

Doug Pollock in his book, "God Space" warns that questions should not be used to gain control of the conversation. They should not be used as a springboard to launch a monologue.

Examples of good "wondering" questions:

- That's an interesting perspective; I'm wondering how you arrived at that conclusion.
- I'm wondering what role religion has played in shaping your life.
- I'm wondering why the topic of God seems to stir up such strong emotions in you.
- I've thought long and hard about our last conversation; here's what I'm still wondering about.
- I'm wondering how my answer to that question made you feel.


Forming a safe caring environment where people can form a faithful response to the gospel through nurturing relationships.
